With quiet strength and a compassionate heart, Angella—our parish nurse and a native of Côtes-de-Fer—makes a fivehour journey by rented motorcycle from Port-au-Prince to care for patients in our twin parish.

During her April visit, she provided vital care at St. Joseph Church and at four remote chapels in Meteyer, Mayette, Morne Blanc, and Boucan Moran traveling by motorcycle to reach each community.

On this trip, Angella served 121 patients, including 23 new participants, checking blood pressure, offering counsel, and bringing comfort where it's needed most.

We are especially grateful to our partners in the Hypertension Program, the Brunswick Chapter of The Links, Inc. Their international committee spearheaded by Dr. Shirley Wilson—has been instrumental in supporting the medical care facet of this ministry.

Thanks to your support, progress continues on the Renard well project. Our drilling partner, Water for Life, has appointed a new project manager, Dr. Hernsie Petit-Frère, MD. Bob Hochwald has been working closely with him to move the project forward.

On May 16, Father Islaire completed construction of the cistern that will store and distribute water to the chapel. Water for Life will soon visit the site to determine the materials needed to connect the well to the cistern for distribution.
